## FROM THE DIRECTOR MICHELLE PROVAZNIK

What an unbelievable year 2021 turned out to be! For The Gardens, it started with continued capacity restrictions and many unknowns of how to plan for the upcoming year. By December, the year ended with a feeling of almost (dare I say) “normal”. Throughout the continually changing guidelines, our beautiful gardens served as a safe haven for our community, a place of education and exploration.

With outdoor capacity restrictions lifted and travel resuming, on-site visitation doubled in 2021. In fact, everything grew – member numbers, education programs, event participation, and our plant collection. You will see that growth reflected throughout this year’s Annual Report.

What you may not directly see reflected is the countless hours of work undertaken by Gardens staff, Friends board members, our beloved Gardens volunteers and community partners for which I am profoundly grateful.

- Because of additional member and donor support to The Friends of the Gardens, we were able to increase seasonal staff support which proved crucial in a year of dramatic growth.
- Volunteers contributed almost 10,000 hours of time – the equivalent of five full-time staff. Our gardens and events wouldn’t be the same without them.
- Community partners made Butterfly House and concert operations possible. These programs simply wouldn’t happen without their help.

## FRIENDS OF THE GARDENS ON SPRING CREEK

The Friends of the Gardens on Spring Creek is the non-profit (501c3) partner of the Gardens on Spring Creek, a City of Fort Collins Cultural Services facility. The Friends is a member-based organization led by a volunteer Board of Directors. Its mission is to cultivate a world-class botanic garden through fundraising and advocacy.

Early in the year, the Friends Board developed goals for 2021, while simultaneously looking out over the next three years. Goals included a strategy to build the current endowment fund, a plan to grow the board of directors, development of a planned giving program, streamlining the membership purchase and renewal process, and increasing memberships.

The Board made much progress towards these ambitious goals: created endowment policies and a case statement for support, launched the Evergreen Legacy Society for donors who have planned gifts to support The Gardens, researched new technologies to streamline the renewal process and saw a significant increase in memberships and membership retention. These efforts lay the foundation for the coming years.

## DEVELOPMENT & MEMBERSHIP

2021 was a remarkable year of fundraising for The Gardens, with overall gifts increasing more than 50% year-over-year. Increased sponsorships, a highly successful Annual Campaign, the Bricks and Benches memorial tribute program, two sold-out Date Night events, and other donations contributed to this record year.

The Friends membership program reached two significant milestones: hitting the financial goal of \$200,000 in memberships to support Gardens operations; and a 64%-member renewal rate, an excellent percentage for member programs. In addition, a new corporate membership program was launched due to interest expressed by local businesses.



# EDUCATION

Due to years of construction followed by the pandemic, The Gardens welcomed back the first full semester of school field trips since 2018. It was wonderful to see groups of students engaging with our gardens and local wildlife. The Gardens also launched its first Spanish language youth program, Spanish Read & Seed. As a result, youth program participation increased by 15% from 2020.

In-person adult education programs returned this year, with program attendance increasing 56%. Wellness programs, including yoga and tai chi, continued to be popular. The Education Team co-developed and piloted Deeply Rooted, a therapeutic horticulture program for residents of assisted living facilities.

In total, The Gardens education programs taught 7,844 students of all ages.

# GARDENS FOR ALL

Gardens for All is a multi-faceted equity and access program to ensure everyone in our community has access to the benefits and experiences available at The Gardens on Spring Creek. Gardens for All is primarily grant and donor funded with some additional support provided by the City of Fort Collins.

The Gardens formed an IDEA (Inclusivity, Diversity, Equity, Accessibility) team to strategically look at The Gardens facility and programs to see how we can improve in all areas.

In 2021, 3,139 guests accessed our gardens through the Gardens for All program. This included 495 guests who attended El Día de Muertos, The Gardens first time hosting this community event.

# VOLUNTEERS

Like the education program, the volunteer program is back on track to pre-construction and pre-pandemic numbers with 411 volunteers contributing 9,637 hours, the equivalent of nearly five full-time staff members. The latest value of a volunteer hour is \$28.54 meaning the total value of volunteer time at The Gardens for 2021 was \$275,028.56.

The Gardens hosted eight interns in the Education, Special Events, and Horticulture Departments. **They included high school students, college students, and adults looking to diversify or improve job skills from the following programs:**

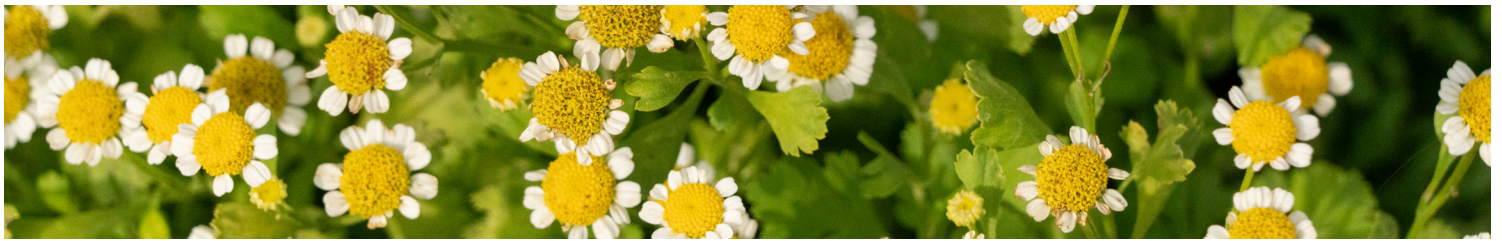
## HORTICULTURE

Much work was done in the Undaunted Garden this year with 1,000 new plants added to the stunning xeric showcase. In addition, 5,900 bulbs were planted in 2021 with a total of 10,500 bulbs planted over the past two years. Rock mulch has been added as bulb plantings were completed.

The Prairie Garden and Rock Garden received a combined 500+ potted plants, over 600 Camassia bulbs, and lots of broadcast seed (as in pounds, not packets). Species count increases were relatively small compared to prior years, with most plants added to increase stands of existing plants.

**As our gardens continue to grow and mature, there were several interesting plants of note throughout 2021:**

- Planted almost 2 years ago, this is the first time our White Bird of Paradise *Strelitzia nicotiana* bloomed in the butterfly house.
- Several orchid cultivars were added to our collection including the *Trichoceros antennifer*, a very rare insect mimic orchid. It mimics an insect, tricking it to land on it thus pollinating the flower. There have been 10-15 orchids donated to the Butterfly House.
- The Voodoo Lily, *Amorphophallus konjac*, bloomed this year and was an absolute hit. It smelled for about a week in the butterfly house but was worth it. Now we have successfully propagated it and expect more to bloom this coming spring.
- The Gardens is working with Plant Select on two plants: *Salvia farinacea* is being tested for winter hardiness and *Liatis* hybrid is going into propagation trials for the program. If it can be propagated vegetatively this spring, the *Liatis* will be accepted for in-ground trials this summer.



# PUBLIC EVENTS

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In 2021, The Gardens hosted a wide variety of special events including several multi-day event series, for a total of 48 event days, engaging a total of 41,983 individuals bringing in a total of \$590,462 in revenue.

## LIVE AT THE GARDENS CONCERT SERIES

The Gardens hosted the first Live at The Gardens Concert Series with six concerts throughout the summer. The first four shows of the year were hosted in partnership with The Bohemian Foundation and were sold with restricted capacities to accommodate the uncertain conditions of the pandemic. The final two shows were held at full capacity with The Lincoln Center as our partner. The Gardens was thrilled to have Herbie Hancock close out the first concert series.

## GARDEN OF LIGHTS

This year’s Garden of Lights broke records, bringing record attendance of nearly 30,000 guests and more revenue than ever before, spreading holiday cheer to our community and beyond. It was wonderful to see the return of Santa and other live entertainment. In addition, a new sound system allowed music to be played throughout the grounds.
